God's Names: Lamb of God, Saviour

He was just a baby - a little boy born to Mary. What should Mary and Joseph name Him? That was easy because an angel had already told them (see Mat. 1:21). His name was easy. What was hard was His job "he will save his people from their sins".

For hundreds and hundreds of years, God's people made animal sacrifices to pay for their sins. Thousands and thousands of animals were killed - bulls, sheep, goats, doves, and pidgeons.

What could this little baby do?

A Saviour is one who comes to "save" God's people from their sins. Was baby Jesus the Saviour? Jesus grew up and became a man. Was He the Saviour? John the Baptist said: "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29) The lamb of God? Jesus is even more than that.

He was not only the baby of Mary — He is also the Son of God, and His names are like God names! Because Jesus is



Tell the World

I have learned over the years that the best moments with your children are those when you open your ears and really listen to what they say. This was one of those days. I was home helping my daughters, Astrid and Edera, with their schoolwork, when we began talking about their day at school. One of my daughters started to talk about a girl that they both knew at school, who is from a non-Adventist family. My heart cried out in joy as one of my daughters said, "Every time I have an opportunity, I talk to her about Jesus." She said this to me like meaning that there is only one important thing to do when you meet other people... and it's to share what you have in your heart... Jesus.

One of the biggest problems we face today as society is "distractions". Our kids, our young people... even the adults are distracted with many things. We have smart phones, we have tablets, we have computers, we can spend hours just looking at what others write on Facebook, or Instagram, or Snapchat. Every day you can find a new game, you can spend hours and hours doing absolutely nothing... distraction.

I still remember that when I was my daughter's age, my mind was occupied with playing with friends, going to school, or watching my favorite TV shows. Even with fewer distractions as kids have today, I wasn't concerned, as my daughters are, with talking to others about Jesus. Or at least I don't remember a specific time when I made the decision to share the Good News. But there in our dining room, in that moment, my daughter taught me an enormous lesson—a lesson that I have learned, but with the busyness and responsibilities of life, often forget. That the most important thing in our lives is to share the love of Jesus with others. For my daughters, at their young age, and even with their busy school schedules, the most important thing for them is to talk to that girl about Jesus.

Let's start with those who, in God's sight, are the most precious ones: Children.

How often do we consider them too young, immature, or not ready to receive Jesus? And yet Jesus places children and their faith as example for us. So let us take eve-

ry opportunity and effort to help children understand God's love for them and receive the best gift ever: Jesus.

Stay blessed throughout 2018, and be a blessing to

others — especially children!

It's time for our annual Christmas pageant, and I'm not too enthusiastic. Do kids really benefit from these?

It depends. Why are you doing these pageants? What do the kids understand to be the reasons for the pageants? Are they fun for the kids, or is a lot of emphasis put on a perfect performance? The answers to these questions will help to determine wether or not these pageants are beneficial to your kids.

Pageants help kids develop skills. If handled properly, these programs can be a good opportunity for kids to develop faith-sharing skills, poise, and self-esteem. These skills are best developed if the director cares more about the kids than a perfect program. Also, kids should be allowed to be involved in more than just the performance. Involve kids in set build-

ing. Involve kids in the orchestral music, if appropriate. Let it be the kids' pageant, not an adult program that happens to involve some children.

- Pageants spotlight the children's ministry. Pageants provide good publicity and visibility for the children's ministry. Adults enjoy seeing children perform; often children's pageants are well-attended even by adults who don't have children in the program. Pageants and programs are a great way to make the rest of your church aware of the children's ministry at your church.
- Pageants are also subtle outreach events. Many unchurched family members will refuse to come to a worship service, but they will come to see

a granddaughter or a nephew in a Christmas pageant. Take advantage of the outreach potential inherent in there programs.

If directing a pageant is outside your area of expertise and talent, delegate it to someone who is comfortable with it. Or put together a pageant-ministry team in which each team member is responsible for a different part of the program. Some publishers offer "instant pageants that require very little preparation but are fun and entertaining for both kids and adults. Check with your local Christian bookstore for these resources.

Question: Did the people in the Bible celebrate Christmas?

Answer: During Christmas we celebrate Jesus' birth. The Christians decided to celebrate Jesus' birth many years after he was born. They chose December 24/25 to celebrate his birth. This date is probably not the exact one when Jesus was born, but that is not important. What matters is to

remember and celebrate, not the gifts and candies, but the birth of Jesus, our Saviour.

If your child asks you about Father Christmas, explain him or her that he was a very useful person to help people celebrate Christmas. Long time ago, the real "Saint Nicholas" took care of poor children during Christmas time and gave them presents. Since then, the story took on such proportions that today, we speak about Father Christmas with his "little red-nosed reindeer" distributing gifts to all the chil-

> dren in the world. Father Christmas is an invention. Jesus, however, is a real being.

December 15-17, Stara Zagora, Bulgaria

The story of Jesus' birth became alive at Galery Mall in the city of Stara Zagora. Enthusiastic members of the church, as well as volunteers outside of the church, organized a special Christmas experience for the children of the city between 5 and 11 years of age, during three days (15-17 of December). With the very first step the participants crossed from modern Stara Zagopra to the ancient town of Bethlehem. At the entrance they were welcomed by a native "Bethlehemer" who ushered them in the atmosphere. The first place the guests were visiting was the exchange office where, under the watchful eye of two legionnaires, they received a purse with Roman dinars. After that they had to present themselves before the Roman administrator who ordered them to fulfill the command of Ceasar Augustus - to register themselves at the census lists, and to pay their taxes. Here every child received a paper assuring the authorities that they had payed their taxes, with their names on it written in Hebrew.

The next stop was the fields of Bethlehem where the local shepherds heard the song of the angels, and the news of the newborn King at the stable. Then they visited a small fragrance shop where to see, touch and smell the gifts of baby Jesus.

While looking for the Son of God, they passed also through a carpenter shop where every child became an apprentice for a while, and worked out a little manger with their own hands. and told them about the family sleeping in his stable. The woman was pregnant, and he felt sorry for them.

At last, the visitors were welcomed at the stable where they met Joseph, Mary and Baby Jesus. The excited parents told them that they had been visited by angels who revealed before them that their Son would be the Saviour of the world. At the exit, just before to leave Bethlehem, all participants were invited to take part in a charity initiative organized along with the Municipality of the city, called "Children give to children".

The event was visited by 110 children and their parents. 75 boxes were collected for the charity initiative, and will be given to children in need.






Children's Sabbath: **Stand & Shine**

Object Talk: **Wrapping** paper

Theme: The best gift ever

Object: rock in a box, beautifully packed; baby doll

Text: "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.."

Isaiah 9:6



Application

Before the object lesson, wrap up an empty box with a rock inside it with festive wrapping paper, a tag and some bows. Make it as pretty and inviting as you can. Wrap a baby doll in a blanket and hide it nearby. Place the gift on a table where it can be seen.

Say, "I love Christmas gifts! They look so wonderful under the tree and you never know what you will get—until you open them. Let me see...I wonder what this gift is?" Pick up the box and shake it. Invite a few children to shake it and guess what it is. Build up the excitement about the gift.

"You know, no matter what is in this box, nothing is better than the gift God gave us. Can anyone guess what that is?" Allow kids to guess then bring out the baby doll. Hold it like it was a real baby, rocking it and keeping it wrapped in a blanket. "That's right, baby Jesus was the gift God sent us. Just imagine, the baby of God, came to earth to walk with us and teach us about God. And then, he gave up his life to forgive of us our sins." Allow kids to hold and rock the baby one at a time.

Ask a volunteer to hold the "baby" while you open the gift. Show kids what was inside of it—just a rock. Say, "Christmas gifts aren't bad but they can't compare to the precious gift of God, Jesus Christ." That's the best gift ever!

Prayer

Lord, help us to appreciate and accept the unique and best gift of all time: Jesus. Thank you for your love. Amen.




